# But At Your Word Luke 5:1-11

## Introduction:

- A. In our text we find Peter and some others after a long, hard night of fruitless fishing.
- B. While they were tending to their nets, Jesus came along and started preaching. Let's see what lessons we can learn from this encounter with Jesus.

## The Crowd (vs. 1-2)

- A. Jesus was standing by the Lake of Gennesaret, also known as the Sea of Galilee.
- B. There was a crowd of people who were "pressing in on him to hear the word of God" (v. 1).
- C. Are we eager to hear a Word from God (Job 23:12; Psa. 119:20; 131; | Pet. 2:2)?

#### The Command (vs. 3-4)

- A. Jesus tells Peter to go out into the deep water and lower his nets so he can catch some fish.
- B. Jesus commanded Peter to do something contrary to all his experience and training. This command went against Peter's experience, comfort and pride.
- C. Are there some commands in scripture that we find difficult to follow (Matt. 7:12; Lk. 6:27; Matt. 18:21-22; Acts 2:38)?

# The Compliance (v. 5)

- A. Peter took Jesus at His word even though the command may have appeared futile.
- B. By obeying the command, Peter demonstrated his faith in Jesus.
- C. Do we have enough faith to take Jesus at His Word and do what He commands of us?

# The Catch (vs. 6-10)

- A. Peter's obedience to Jesus brought about great results (vs. 9-10).
- B. When we take Jesus at His word and obey Him, the results will be well worth it (Heb. 5:9).
- C. We may not know exactly why God is calling us to do certain things, but we can be sure that when we do what He says, we will experience great blessings.

## **Conclusion:**

- A. Peter and the others left the greatest catch of their lives to surrendered their lives to Jesus (v. 11).
- B. To follow Jesus means to obey Him and surrender your life to Him (Rom. 12:1). Will you do that?
