Immanuel: God With Us Week 2: A Better Understanding

John 14:5-11

INTRODUCTION:

- A. God left heaven and came to earth to dwell among us (Phil. 2:3-8).
- B. Why would Jesus make so many sacrifices to come and dwell among man?

PHILIP'S QUESTION

- A. Philip asked Jesus to show them the Father and that would be enough (Jn. 14:8).
- B. It seems Philip was asking for what is commonly known as a theophany. A theophany is when God revealed himself in some form to humans (Gen. 32:22-32; Exo. 3-4; 24:9-11).
- C. This is how many people respond to God today. They think if they could just see God that would be enough for them and they would believe and obey Him.

JESUS'S RESPONSE

- A. The Old Testament had foretold the coming of the Messiah (Isa. 7:14; 9:6). The Jews were expectantly waiting for His arrival.
- B. Not only had the Jews missed it, but even His very own disciples had missed it. Jesus had done the very thing Philip was asking Him to do (Jn. 14:9-11). His words and works proved that. Many people followed Jesus because they saw the signs He had done on the sick (Jn. 6:2).
- C. If we want to know God, look at Jesus and His life (Col. 1:15; 2:9).

JESUS GIVES US A BETTER UNDERSTANDING OF THE FATHER

- A. Through Jesus we see that God values people.
 - 1. Jesus spent time with the social outcast of His day (Lk. 5:27-32; 19:1-10; Jn. 4:27).
 - 2. God values us so much that He knows how many hairs are on our heads (Lk. 12:6-7).
- B. Through Jesus we see that God is patient with people.
 - 1. Jesus was patient with His disciples on many occasions (Matt. 8:26; Jn. 14:8-9).
 - 2. God is patient with us because He doesn't want anyone to perish (2 Pet. 3:9).
- C. Through Jesus we see that God forgives people.
 - 1. Jesus asked God to forgive those who hung Him on a cross (Lk. 23:34).
 - 2. God wants to forgive us of all our sins (I Jn. 1:9).

CONCLUSION:

- A. By coming to earth Jesus better helps us see and understand the Father.
- B. If we want to know what God is like, just look at the life of Jesus.
